"Dignity in Every Drop: Advancing Menstrual Health Policy in Nigeria" POLICY BRIEF

? Context:

Menstrual health intersects with health, gender equality, education, sanitation, and economic development. Yet, in Nigeria, menstrual health is **underfunded**, **understudied**, **and underprioritized**.

☐ Policy Problems:

- No national policy on menstrual health exists.
- Product affordability is undermined by taxes and import restrictions.
- School and community WASH infrastructure is underfunded. (WASH stands for Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene).
- Social norms and stigma prevent open conversation or policy prioritization.

© Policy Recommendations:

- 1. **Establish a National Menstrual Health Framework**—with timelines, budget allocations, and measurable outcomes.
- 2. **Amend the education and health curriculum** to include menstrual literacy at all school levels.
- 3. **Subsidize or distribute menstrual products** in schools, correctional facilities, IDP camps, and rural PHCs.
- 4. Develop **state-level menstrual dignity task forces** for localized action.
- 5. **Incentivize local production** of eco-friendly menstrual products through grants and tax relief.

Call to Action:

Nigeria has committed to ending poverty, improving education, and advancing gender equality. None of these can be achieved if girls are bleeding in silence.

Make menstrual health part of your legacy. Champion dignity.
